



CALL FOR PAPER

ENPHO invites interested research scholars and agencies to submit research papers and/or review articles to publish in ENPHO Journal “**Journal of Environment and Public Health**” to be published on the occasion of World Water Day 2018. The publication will comprise of technical and scientific research papers and review articles.

The theme for World Water Day 2018 is “**Nature-based Solutions for Water**”. Therefore, we are calling for the submission of articles and papers on the following subjects:

- Rainwater harvesting and groundwater recharge
- Drinking water treatment options (SODIS, biosand filter, slow sand filter, rapid sand filter)
- Ecological sanitation (Urine diversion toilet, biogas technology, composting, faecal sludge management, rooftop farming)
- Natural wastewater treatment systems (Constructed Wetlands, Waste Stabilization Ponds, Aquatic Plant Systems)
- Integrated Water Resource Management case studies linked to water optimization, wastewater management, drinking/river water quality monitoring

Authors are kindly requested to go through the “Guideline for Author” and submit the paper accordingly.

The deadline for submission of the abstract is **15 September 2017**. If the abstract is selected, the paper needs to be submitted by **30 November 2017**. Abstract and paper should be emailed to: resourcecenter@enpho.org

Guideline for Author

1. General:

The research papers or articles should be submitted in English and should not exceed 3000 words in length, including Figures and Tables. It should not contain more than 5 figures and/or tables. (Note: Separate high resolution files of the figures and/or tables are required. Figures and charts in pattern have to be provided)

- Upon request by the editors, authors must make necessary revisions of their papers and submit within a week of the request.
- No payment will be made for papers published in the magazine.
- The papers must be submitted in electronic copies in word format.
- The paper after proof reading will be sent to the author for the final consent. This will cover only the grammatical and typing errors. The author must reply within two days of the request.
- The preferred font style is Times New Roman of 12 pt. All paragraphs should be left indented.

2. Format

- **Title:** The title of the paper should be clear and concise. If possible, it should not be more than two lines and limited to 20 words. Using special characters should be avoided.
- **Author:** The title section should also state the names and full addresses of all authors.
Eg. Author Name*, Author Name**
Author Name includes Initials then Surnames and separated by commas for more than one author.
Shrestha, X., Sharma, Y.* and Singh, Z. ***
* include first author's address
** include second author's address (if different than first author's address)
The full name of the institution to which the authors are affiliated (if applicable) need to be mentioned (eg. Environment and Public Health Organization, Nepal).
Also, the email address of the corresponding author is mandatory.
- **Abstract:** It should be short and clear description of the main facts or ideas of the paper. Abstract should not be more than 200 words. It must briefly explain the objective, methods, main results and the conclusion obtained.

- **Keywords:** Under the abstract, up to five keywords should be listed in alphabetical order and separated by comma. Words appearing in title need not be included in keywords.
- **Introduction:** The introduction section should clearly state the background and the objectives of your work. No extensive literature review is needed for an outline paper but major accomplishments with the respective literature influencing your work should be mentioned.
- **Methods:** This includes a brief description of the methods/techniques used (the principles of these methods should not be described if readers can be directed to easily accessible references or standard texts).
- **Results:** This section should summarize clearly the experimental results obtained or the major outcomes of the performed study. Any trends or points of interest should be highlighted. All major results presented in the outline paper should be supported and/or proved by graphical presentations or tabular results.

If you wish to present your results in a tabular form or by using graphical presentations, use the following formats for tables and figures.

Figures and tables should appear in numerical order, be described in the body of the text and be positioned close to where they are first cited. Make sure that all figures and tables will fit inside the text area.

Please ensure that all figures are clearly labeled and easily readable in black and white printing.

Table 1 This is a style for Table titles. “**Table 1, Table 2** etc” should be in bold. Table captions should appear above tables.

For Example:

Figure 1 This is a style for Figure legends. “**Figure 1, Figure 2** etc” should be in bold. Figure legends should appear below figures.

For Example:

Figure 1 | Title of the figure

- **Discussion:** This section should explain what your results mean and what contribution your paper makes to the field of study.
- **Conclusion:** It should be clear and precise. It needs to summarize the content and purpose of the paper.

- **Acknowledgement:** You can acknowledge the contributors and supporters. This section should not exceed 10 lines.
- **References:** For citations in main text, use surname of author and year of publication eg. (Ellingsen, 2012). Insert initials only if there are two different authors with the same surname and same year of publication. The abbreviation “*et al.*” should be used in the text when there are more than two co-authors of a cited paper eg. (Jha *et al.*, 2011)

References should be listed alphabetically at the end of the outline paper. Although “*et al.*” is preferable in the text, in the list of references all authors should be given. Most recent references should be included.
